David Shrigley's tongue-in-cheek neon works presented as a shopfront during frieze art fair

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stephen friedman gallery followed a different approach at this year's <u>frieze art fair</u>, presenting the work of <u>david shrigley</u> in the form of a shopfront display. best known for his tongue-in-cheek, deadpan works, the british artist has created five new, large-scale neons that showcase his caustic sense of humor, accompanied by a major two-screen digital animation, a new sound-based installation and a new body of works on paper.

rendered in his distinctive handwriting, the neons were installed in shop windows visible from outside of the stephen friedman gallery's booth, adding a playful vibrancy to the display. david shrigley has drawn from the format of neon street signs or advertisements, undermining their authority with his nonsensical messages. upon entering the booth, visitors encountered new works on paper, including the series of proclamatory headlines reminiscent of those traditionally displayed outside newsagents. during the opening day of frieze, these works were replaced on an hourly basis, keeping visitors up to date with the

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artist's absurd 'news' of the day, whilst also giving a nod to the oversaturated nature of the media.

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

a two-screen installation titled 'endless joint' was on display for the first time in the UK inside the booth, which captures a succession of characters caught in a perpetual cycle of smoking. on a separate room, a satirical, sound-based installation with shrigley's vocal imitation of extractor fans and a series of mock extractor hoods demonstrated the artist's uncanny ability to play with the mundane nature of banal objects and scenarios. inspired by the noisy judder of his foundry's extractor fans, shrigley has recorded his own vocal imitation of the machines in four different octaves. the harmony is played on an endless loop.

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


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

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


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
